Time allowance each fortnight	9 hours

Introduction

The course offered is A Level AQA History, which is a linear course. There are two examinations at the end of Year 13 (worth 40% each) and a historical investigation (20%).

The exams offered are:

1. Tudor England, 1485-1603
2. International Relations and Global Conflict, c.1890-1941.

The Historical Investigation is an extended piece of coursework which should cover a 100 year period, and should not overlap with the content of the two exams.
