The act of eating, texting and listening to music &/or watching videos on You tube whilst being in a room with an open textbook roughly nearby'



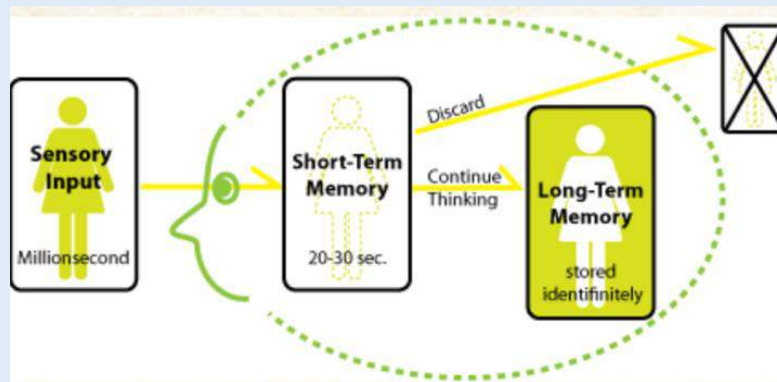

Structured Revision

- Memories are stronger the more we retrieve them. To retrieve a memory, the brain revisits the nerve pathways created when the memory was formed. Repeatedly recalling information helps strengthen those connections and memories
- Simple repetition - retrieving a memory over and over again is the best way to consolidate learning
- Starting the next day with what has been learnt the day before will help



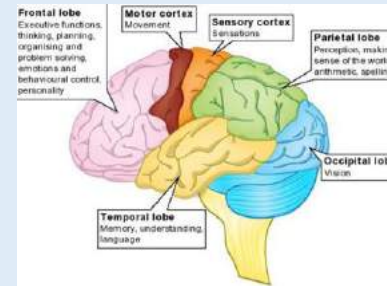
Your Memory

- Just reading, highlighting or copying text will not work. We need to engage with information on a deeper level to remember it. Re-organising notes, hand-outs and books will help, also making charts, mind mapping or using pictures
- We build up a more exact memory if we are exposed to the same information from lots of different perspectives. It is a good idea to revise using different sources rather than reading the same handout, notes or books.



Revision by Association

- The brain accesses information via the senses
- We often remember facts when we are exposed to other things that also happen at the same time, associating memories with triggers
- When we connect new information with something familiar, we are creating multiple reference points that help the mind sort and store information.



Learning/Revision Techniques

Map It Create a mind map of the key points. 	Journey It Remember lots of information by placing images on a journey. 	Index It Transfer the key points to index cards. 
Story It Create a weird and vivid story using the key points. 	Mnemonic It Use the first letter of keywords to create a sentence. A real mnemonic: Sour Eat Mashed Wheat 	Click It Create a presentation about the key points. 
Flip It Write questions and answers and flip it anywhere. 	Timeline It Place key points along a line in date order. 	Sing It Set key points to a familiar music/rap. 
Record It Use your mobile to record yourself explaining the key points and play it back regularly. 	Post It Write key points on to Post Its and stick them around your room. 	Comic It Create your own comic strip using the key points. 



Visual

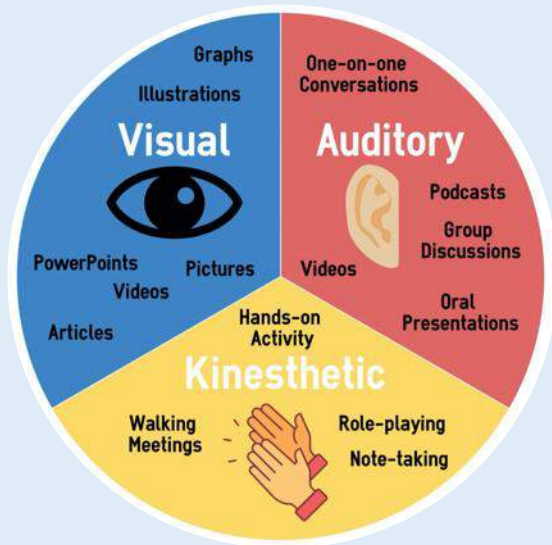
Learn with pictures, colours, maps & diagrams etc.

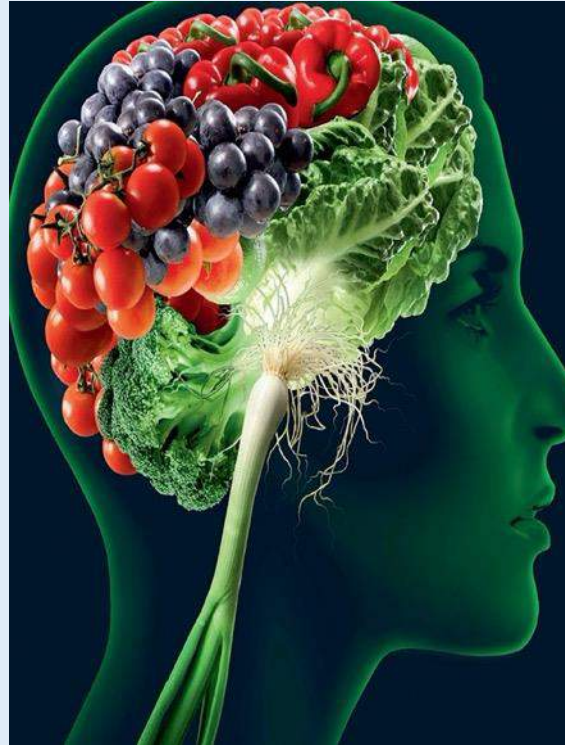
